What's the Big Deal about Family Groups?

The Heartbeat of the Church

As we discussed in our Leaders Workshop on January 7th, Small groups are the heartbeat of the church and an essential part for bringing God's vision to life.

If small groups are the heartbeat, then Acts 2:42-47 is the lifeblood that sustains them.

The staff and elders' team are excited to work together with our small group leaders and members to put **Acts 2** into practice.

Measuring Spiritual Health

Developing Maturity within your Family Group

Actively measuring your spiritual health is a practice that can keep our minds and hearts freshly cultivated as we strive to be more like Jesus. It also recognizes your need for deeper meaning and understanding in your walk with God. When we're spiritually healthy, we are more connected to God and those around us. Clarity marks our daily choices, and our actions become more consistent with our beliefs and values. As we journey together as leaders, let's look closer at five measurements of spiritual health that will help our family groups become stronger:

Worship: To honor or show reverence for God. The most common Hebrew word for "worship" (*Shachah*) literally means "bend over" or "bow down." It demonstrates an understanding of who God is and submission to Him (e.g., Genesis 18:2, Exodus 20:4 – 6).

<u>Fellowship:</u> A gathering of souls who decide to live, work, practice, study, play, and share all things we have in common in Christ.

<u>Discipleship:</u> Simply, the process of us helping each other become more like Jesus!

<u>Ministry/Service</u>: Working together in our family groups to meet the needs of many in our shared community.

Evangelism: Spreading the grace & truth of the Gospel of Christ to the community you are planted in and beyond. This "spreading" can take many forms, but the ultimate goal is the conversion of hearts to Jesus as Lord & Savior! To be certain, our

love for our neighbor does not change even

FAITH, HOPE, AND LOVE

The Charlotte Church 2023 Theme

Known as the LOVE chapter, 1 Corinthians 13 stands out as one of the most meaningful. It culminates in verse 13 with our theme passage, "And now these things remain, faith, hope and love. But the greatest of these is love."

Let's begin the discussion on our theme with the word faith. Hebrews 11:1 tells us that faith is the "...assurance in what we do not see." Romans 10:17 tells us that "faith comes from hearing the message...". In James 2:17 we learn that faith is dead unless it is accompanied by action. From these three passages we can conclude that our assurance is increased by our study of God's word as we put it into practice.

Biblical **hope** is confidence in a future outcome, **Romans 8:24-25**. Our ultimate hope is in the reward stored up for us in heaven, but our hope is not limited to the

everlasting. It is also a hope that is enjoyed through dreaming of what Jesus will do with us and through us as we walk with Him on earth.

We have covered faith and hope, but these are not the greatest. The greatest is **love**, and it grows through relationship: **to know and to be known.** Each of us has love stories to share and blind spots to discover. Satan wants us to forget them or to ignore them.

He wants us to settle for the shallow. By being vulnerable with one another, our love for one another increases. But remember that an essential ingredient is trust, which is built by investing time in, praying for, and praying with one another.

Our goal this year is to strengthen family groups and family group leaders through



studying God's word together and through sharing our dreams and our stories of love. Let's learn how to walk with each other through life as we each walk with Jesus in faith, hope and love.
